NEW LIFE AND EASTER PEOPLE

I love spring. As the season unfolds, colors gradually appear, temperatures warm, animals begin to stir, and the world around us awakens from its winter slumber. Spring is also the season of Easter, in which we celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and His victory of life over death once and for all. I've always loved the timing of these two experiences. To me, it is as if nature itself is testifying to the truth of Easter in its beautiful expressions of new life coming into being after the cold of winter.

Much about our world today is cold and hostile toward life. We continue to live in a time where "normal" is elusive and things may never be as they once were before the pandemic. A war rages in Ukraine with great tragedy and loss of life. We are beset with economic concerns. All of us could add personal issues to this list. Yet, in the face of all these things, the Easter truth is that they do not have the final say. On Good Friday, we witness the brokenness, of which all these things are a part, being confronted by Christ as He is nailed to the Cross.

And then, despite that brokenness, new life shines through. Christ rises in victory on the third day! Even though the darkness persists, it does not win. We, as people living into this Easter truth, can trust that life wins, that hope endures, and that Christ is victorious. Even as we see and experience bouts of cold and death, the color, warmth, and vitality of Christ's new life breaks into our world making things new, even now, and giving us hope for tomorrow.

We don't have to look far to find expressions of that new life. At church things are revitalizing. Worship attendance is strong and the percentage of people worshiping in-person is trending upwards. Attendance to Wesley Night activities is rising. The Marks of Discipleship class on Sunday morning has had great participation. Many of our groups are beginning to meet again (some for the first time in two years!). We are making connections with new visitors, returning

guests, and new members.
Five young people are in the
Confirmation process and are
preparing to transition to another
level of their faith journey. God is at work in our church.
New life is present.

In 2 Corinthians 5:17, Paul says "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (NRSV).

On Ash Wednesday, many people wrote struggles and obstacles on pieces of purple paper. We then burned these as a means of offering them to God (See cover photo). Now, as Easter approaches, we celebrate the fact that God received those, and that He frees us to lead new lives empowered by His grace. Even if the struggles continue, they do not win. God calls us to see the opportunities He places in our experiences to come alongside Christ and participate in new life in the world and in ourselves.

As Spring continues and we enter the Easter season, let's ask God to open our eyes to the expressions of new life around us. Let's open ourselves to the guiding of the Holy Spirit. Let's lean into the opportunities to be part of the healing and grace God works in the world. We, as Christians, are an Easter people. We serve a risen Lord. As the world around us wakes up from winter sleep, let us also awake to the renewal God invites us into, in ourselves and in our world. The Lord brings hope, life, and love. Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen indeed! Amen.

Staff Spotlight:

Jim McFarland, Director of Music/Organist



I joined the St. Paul staff in March of 2013. I am a lifelong United Methodist and have spent most of my life in Kentucky. I have previously served as a musician in Episcopal, Disciples of Christ, Presbyterian, and Catholic churches in Kentucky and Texas. I love collaborating with my colleagues as we design and implement worship that is vital, vibrant, and life-affirming.

My duties at St. Paul include planning music for the Traditional worship services and playing the organ for those services as well as weddings and funerals/memorial services that occur. I am tasked with planning music, for, rehearsing, and directing the Chancel Choir and Bells of St. Paul Handbell Ensemble. I am responsible for hiring our soloists/section leaders for the Chancel Choir. I



am also charged with periodically organizing a St. Paul Church Orchestra, and with putting together a concert series when we are no longer in a pandemic.

I have personally played organ recitals as part of our concert series, and I have directed the Chancel Choir and Chamber Orchestra in performances of large-scale classical and sacred works. Each year I am tasked with producing the Louisville Boar's Head & Yule Log Festival in late December. I convene the Boar's Head Steering Committee to raise the funds to put on the festival each year, and to marshal volunteers to help with all of the tasks necessary to produce a successful festival. I personally hire all of the professional musicians for the festival, and I plan and direct all of the music for the festival with the help of my colleagues.

Additionally, I am tasked with accompanying the Joyful Song, Wesleyan Choir, and Youth Choir in rehearsals and worship, and I thoroughly enjoy

working closely with Karla and the children and Youth. They keep you on your toes, and never cease to amaze me with their curiosity and dedication to God through the use of their musical talents in worship and outreach. Some of most amazing

musical adventures are our Music Camp week in July, and our Youth FUSION Tours in June each year.



As Director of Music, Loversee and work

closely with Karla Temple, our Associate Director of Music, and with Lori Elbert, our KOINONIA Worship Leader. I am grateful for both of them as they are both dedicated believers, consummate musicians, and just plain wonderful people. Lori, Karla, and I coordinate with the Worship & Music Team to make sure that all aspects of worship run smoothly. This includes recruiting ushers, greeters, people to set-up communion, and people to help serve communion. We also coordinate with our volunteers who help decorate the Sanctuary and KOINONIA spaces for the seasons of the church year. I enjoy collaborating with them as we plan worship, and I enjoy working and being in fellowship with all of the wonderful staff here at St. Paul.

Highlands Community Blood Drive

All blood drives take place in the Youth Center in the St. Paul Family Life Center from 9:00am-1:00pm.

- 1) Make an appointment: www.redcrossblood.org. We would prefer no walk-ins.
- 2) Use Rapid Pass on the day of donation. It will expedite the process once at St. Paul.
- 3) Wear a mask during donation, as required by Red Cross. Masks will be available on site as well.

Temperatures will be taken prior to entering the Youth Center.

Effective March 7, the Red Cross has resumed testing all blood, platelet, and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies for a limited time. Results may indicate an antibody response after receiving a COVID-19 vaccine or possible past exposure to this coronavirus - and may identify donations with antibody levels necessary to potentially help COVID-19 patients with weakened immune systems.

Vision Team Goal: The White Building

One of the 10 goals assigned to the Vision Team involves assisting the church to devise a "go forward" plan for the White Building. The church owns the residential duplex facing Douglass Blvd., adjacent to the parking lot by the Family Life Center. This building has seen multiple uses over the years, but has most recently served as a storage facility and (occasional) meeting place for the Boy Scouts.

Over the next few months, in serving my role with the Vision Team, I will be assisting the Trustees and our staff sponsor, Dustin Woods, to move toward settling on a plan for this building.

As a part of this process, we would like to solicit feedback from the congregation on possible uses for the building. We will review all ideas received and then submit the three most feasible options to the staff and Administrative Board for consideration.

From there, our next steps would be to understand the costs involved to prepare the building for the desired use.

Please know that if we decide to use the building for gatherings/meeting space/service projects, etc., the White Building



will require some significant work. Decisions will need to be made at that step in the process as well. However, now is the time to explore any/all ideas, so dream big! We have heard several potential ideas floated for potential use, but we would like to hear from you! Please send your ideas to Jason Ramsey at: ideastrum.

Vision Goal 3: Volunteers at St. Paul "Every member has a ministry."

"Every member has a ministry." That's the theme of Vision Goal 3. The 2024 GOAL is that 300 people have volunteered annually in one of St. Paul's ministry events or programs, including 100 new people. The 2022 benchmark is to have 200 people volunteering, including 50 new people. Part of that goal is tracking that involvement so we can affirm the engagement of each member of the family of faith here. If you are volunteering in any way, we'd like to know about it.

As we saw a few Sundays ago when Tori led us in the Hokey Pokey, we're all parts of one body and we work together to make this community, sometimes while singing and laughing, other times while working in sober situations. You can see volunteers everywhere at St. Paul, and as you see them, you might want to join them in new or renewed ways.

The theme of the current sermon series is inviting, encouraging, and connecting disciples. In the March 6 service, Rev. Brandon preached on inviting and encouraging, using the story of Zacchaeus. Jesus invited Zacchaeus to join him at the table. He encouraged Zacchaeus to be a part of his community. Because he was invited, Zacchaeus changed his life and his priorities to follow Jesus.

At St. Paul, we have been invited and encouraged to be part of the family of Christ, and we are invited to encourage others and to connect with them in worship and service.

There's a place for each of you to share your gifts of talent and time, in ways great and small. You can help in the church office, be an usher, call shut-ins, teach a class, work on a Habitat House or with a refugee family. You can sing in the choir or help with the Resource Center. We know that you may be volunteering, but right now we may not be aware of it. Part of this goal is noting volunteer efforts and

tracking those efforts. We have a robust software system named Shelby that has the capacity to help us see where we have people involved and where we have needs.

Our goal is to have 300 people involved in some aspect of ministry and volunteering by 2024. We think we have 200 people involved, but we want to document that.

The Christian writer Catherine Marshall wrote the novel *Christy*, a story of a wealthy young woman from Asheville, North Carolina who gave up a privileged life to live and work in mountainous East Tennessee after reading the words of Jesus: "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you" - Luke 6:38. That's such a beautiful image of giving and being blessed.

Darren used an image of service that has resonated with me, that of giving a bouquet of flowers to someone: the flowers bless the one who receives them, but the giver is, in turn, blessed by the aroma that lingers. Paul says much the same thing in 2 Corinthians 2:15-16. For we are the aroma of Christ to God among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing, to one a fragrance from death to death, to the other a fragrance from life to life.
