

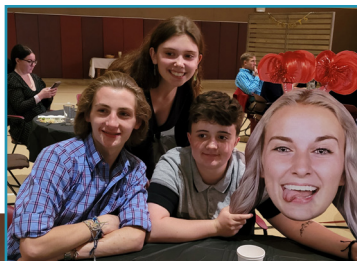

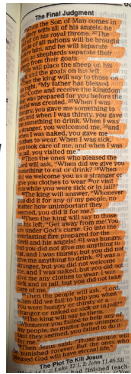


# SEE LIKE JESUS; BE LIKE JESUS

*"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me."*



*"Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' 'The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'" - Matthew 25: 34-405*

I have a copy of the Bible called *The Poverty and Justice Bible*, which highlights in orange all the biblical passages that illustrate God's passion for issues of poverty and justice. As you might guess, this passage from Matthew 25 is completely highlighted in orange. You'll find another reference to this passage in Graeme Donovan's article about St. Paul's emerging Diversity Ministry on page 4 of this issue of the Tower. *It's an important passage.*

When I read this well-worn passage, I am most struck by Jesus identifying with those in need. He sees himself in each of those people - the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the imprisoned. Likewise, we are to see Jesus in everyone we encounter and treat them with compassion. See like Jesus; be like Jesus.

If you attended worship or watched online on May 22, you heard a brief presentation by Anna Twyman, a member of the St. Paul Vision Team, regarding the work of the St. Paul Resource Center. You also saw a video showing the evolution of the Resource Center, which had to pivot when the pandemic hit to find new ways to continue serving the community. If you missed the video, you can watch it and learn more about the Resource Center at our website: <https://www.stpaulchurchky.org/the-resource-center/>.

As Anna noted in her comments, **the Resource Center is currently St. Paul's primary outreach to the community - it is one of many ways the St. Paul congregation seeks to see and be like Jesus.**

While the Resource Center continues to provide for folks who stop by the church in need of assistance, we also share our resources with other ministries and organizations, such as Highland Community Ministries. And we have entered into a partnership with Fourth Avenue UMC to serve those in the inner city and Old Louisville, via our Mobile Resource Center (MRC). On the second Saturday of each month, we load up the St. Paul bus with clothing, shoes, toiletries, and other necessities to serve guests at the Open Door Community Ministry (ODCM), operated by Fourth Avenue UMC on the corner of Fourth Avenue and St. Catherine Street in Old Louisville.

At one of our first MRCs, one of our volunteers was helping a guest find an item he needed. The volunteer was friendly but had gone directly into salesperson mode: "What size can I help you find?" The guest stated his size but then said, "It's more than just giving me clothes. Talk with me like I'm a person, like I matter." I'm paraphrasing, but essentially, this guest was challenging the volunteer to see him as a fellow human being, not just as someone in need - to see him the way Jesus sees him. To the volunteer's credit, he welcomed the challenge, thanking the guest for his honesty. To be like Jesus and do as he asked us to do, we must see others the way Jesus sees them.

On June 11, 2022, the Mobile Resource Center (MRC) will celebrate one year of operation. On June 12, Jack Steiner will be at St. Paul for one of our Sunday Morning Forums. We will discuss the work that St. Paul UMC and Fourth Ave UMC are doing together to see and be like Jesus.

## Vision Team Goal #5: Diversity Ministry

"I was a stranger and you welcomed me." "I was a stranger, and you did not welcome me." Matthew 25: 35, 43. Are you ready to welcome strangers at St. Paul?

"The early centuries of the Christian church, which included periodic persecution, were also a period of explosive growth, due (in part) to the communal compassion that distinguished believers: their care for widows and orphans; their welcoming of strangers and concern for the outcast." – Michael Gerson, Washington Post, November 2, 2015.

On February 7, 2022, the Vision Team and the Strategic Renovation Team agreed to change the name of its # 5 Goal to 'Diversity Ministry': and to include in this goal three things to start with: Partnership with Coke Memorial UMC, Refugee Ministry, and Habitat work.

Recently, two of these initiatives accomplished major steps forward: On March 4, 2022, St. Paul concluded successfully its agreement with Kentucky Refugee Ministries for financial and other support to settling the 11-member Khalili family from Afghanistan; and on April 30, 2022, the latest Habitat House was dedicated. It's cause for celebration that these major achievements happened even in the midst of Covid.

**Refugee Ministry:** Near midnight on November 30, 2021, a 12-person group from St. Paul met the Khalili family at the Louisville International Airport. The church bus took them to their rental home for their first night in Louisville. The initial welcoming team grew to nearly forty volunteers who provided both in-kind and financial assistance for rent, food, clothing, toiletries, linen, furniture, home furnishings, appliances, table ware, rugs, draperies, TV, cell phones, a computer, sewing machine, bicycles, and toys. The team also assisted the family with orientation to the city, outings, transportation, shopping, home repairs, school enrollment, and learning English. Many on the team want to help another family. For more

**Habitat Ministry:** Following their agreement with Habitat, a group from St. Paul started their construction work in October, 2021, of a home to be owned by Ardo Samriye and her family from Somalia, who arrived in Louisville as refugees some time ago. The four bedroom house off Cane Run Road was built by seven persons from St. Paul (led by Ray Fore) in collaboration with teams from two other United Methodist churches: St. Matthews and St. John. In spite of difficulties finding enough people to help because of Covid, the house was finished in a relatively short period of time. Under Ray's leadership, St. Paul has assisted with 14 houses since beginning Habitat work in 1995. **Coke Memorial Partnership:** The partnership was launched about two years ago, in the form of St. Paul/Coke conversations via Zoom that focused on increasing understanding of racism and healing racial divides. Seven such events were held successfully, bringing the two churches to the point where joint community activities would be the next focus. One such activity was held in 2021 when the two churches sponsored a health fair to raise awareness of medical facilities and wellness help available in the neighborhood of Coke Memorial. Going forward, conversations will focus on ways of deepening and extending joint activities. 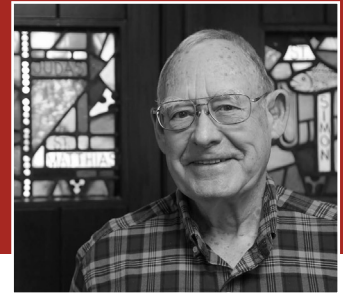

## Staff Spotlight:

# Jim Murphy

## Project Coordinator



You might ask, "Why is a person who has been retired for 15 years working again?" And I ask that question, too. Here's why. There is a task that needs to be done, and I have some history with the task and am willing to learn how to do what needs to be done, to serve St. Paul. But, more importantly, to serve my God.

In November of 2019, Pastor Darren asked if I would be willing to assist with property matters of the church on a part-time, short-term basis. In June of 2020, an associate pastor would be appointed that would assume the tasks of a church administrator.



In the interim, there was a need for someone to see that the various property concerns were addressed. I think there were two circumstances that lead Pastor Darren to ask me. First, I was leading a project to upgrade the lighting for our stained glass window that faces Bardstown Road, as a volunteer and concerned church member,

and second, I had served on the church staff as the church administrator at St. Paul for ten years from 1997 to 2007. Since I was familiar with the building and its needs and knew some of the contractors that maintained various systems, it was fairly easy for me to accept the position.

When Pastor Dustin joined the staff in July of 2020, I helped him get oriented to his new responsibilities, then retired again. However, I hung around as a volunteer to try to organize what had been our archives. Various items and records had been stored in various places in various ways, and I hoped to get them in better shape.

Early in 2021, when it was discovered that there was a problem with our financial administrator functions, I again stepped in to help resolve the situation. So here I am, presently working as a financial administrator with the help of Pastor Darren and Pastor Dustin to maintain the accounting and reporting functions that give the congregation confidence that the finances of the church are handled properly. When a new financial administrator is hired and trained, I hope to again join the ranks of the retired, spending more time on the golf course than in the finance office.

I came to St. Paul as an ordained Deacon in the United Methodist Church to serve on staff as the Director of Ministries and Administration. Prior to coming here, I was on staff at First United Methodist Church in Lexington, Kentucky where I served for 23 years. I started there as Director of Youth and Education. I was certified as a Director of Christian Education by the United Methodist Church in 1979 and was consecrated as a Diaconal Minister that same year by the Kentucky Annual Conference. Through the years at First UMC, I transitioned to the position of Director of Program and Administration and was certified as a Church Administrator by the Council on Finance and Administration of the United Methodist Church and the National Association of Church Business Administration.



I think what I most want to say about my employment in the church is that every step I took and every certification, consecration, and ordination I accomplished was to affirm my calling to serve Christ and his church in the best way I could.

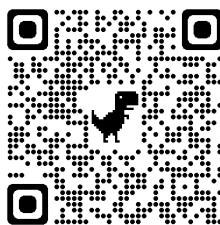

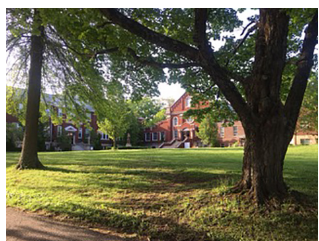

# St. Paul Retreat to Recharge and Renew Set for Sept. 24

Most definitions of "retreat" include the concept of drawing back from daily responsibilities. The military defines retreat as moving away from danger. Sometimes our lives are like that; we feel like we are fighting schedules and responsibilities every day. Our minds and souls need rest, and sometimes we just have to schedule it.



With that in mind, the St. Paul Discipleship and Spiritual Formation Team is planning a Fall retreat for Saturday, Sept. 24 at the Mount St. Francis Retreat Center on Spirituality from 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. It is a lovely

property, just 15 minutes from downtown Louisville, in Mount St. Francis, IN.
