

Spiritual Formation & Discipleship

The past year has been a great one for Discipleship at St. Paul!

Much work has been done on tracking participation in various church small groups and ministries. Tracking is ongoing, but numbers on adult participation show that over 150 St. Paul adults are involved in at least one group or ministry outside of Sunday morning worship! Information for kids and youth is being gathered and will add to this number. An up-to-date small group directory is available for people to see the various offerings that St. Paul has for folks to take part in.

In the fall of 2020 and spring of 2021, Wesley Night saw an average of 45 people at the meals and 19 at the adult studies. The fall 2021 Wesley Night season began on September 14th. The first meal had 67 people in attendance

The first meal had 67 people in attendance! Twenty-one people attended the first class

session of the adult study on *Resilience in Life and Faith*, a book study on resilience both in the Scriptures and our lives. Also, 35 children and youth attended the kids choirs

and youth activities for the first Wesley Night of the year.

On May 22, the church hosted a New Member and Visitor Breakfast. 14 of our newest members or interested visitors attended. At this meal, they were honored and welcomed. They were also introduced to staff and lay leaders of various church groups and invited to ask questions and get to know more about our church, its people, and its opportunities.

In September, 2022, about 21 members from St. Paul participated in a retreat at Mt. St. Francis Retreat Center. This day-long experience was a wonderful time of renewal, spiritual

Worship & Music

St. Paul celebrated weekly worship services, plus special services for Advent and Holy Week. These services were done with the help of many dedicated volunteers, including communion servers, ushers, children's choirs, youth choir, adult choir, instrumentalists, handbell ensemble, various soloists, and lay readers.

Our All Saints celebration in Traditional worship included a string ensemble, which provided beautiful music for the Prelude and Postlude. In both services, we celebrated the lives of 27 saints who have gone on before us by speaking their names aloud, ringing a bell in their honor, and offering flowers to family members who were present at the services.

August 2022: **Youth Choir** resumed rehearsals and will continue to participate in worship throughout the year. The Youth Choir has grown in numbers and has **thirty 7th-12th graders** currently participating.

Our Lenten journey began on Ash Wednesday with Communion and the imposition of Ashes. We collected our burdens by writing them on cards and then burned them in a fire to offer them to God.

Holy Week

Maundy Thursday: During this service, led by the Koinonia worship team, we relived the events of the Upper Room with monologues, special music, meditations, and prayer stations.



Good Friday: a noon service remembered the crucifixion of our Lord and Savior through prayer, scripture, hymns, and special music. An evening service of Tenebrae was led by the Chancel Choir, which provided musical commentary to the reading of the scriptures describing the passion and crucifixion of our Lord, ending in complete darkness and silence.

Easter Sunday: We celebrated the resurrection of our Lord in three services. An outdoor sunrise service celebrated with music, singing, preaching of the word, and lighting of candles



as we watched the sun rise over the church. Our Koinonia worship service was a celebration of joy and color and Alleluias to rejoice in the Good News of Christ's resurrection. Our Traditional service was a festive service with organ, choir, and brass ensemble as we with hymns, anthems, preaching, and many Alleluias!

Some 36 children and 18 youth participated in our Annual Summer Music Camp and led us in worship on July 17.

Children's Choirs have resumed for the fall, with 12 Preschool/Kindergartners participating in Music Milestones Class, 14
1st-3rd graders in Joyful Song Choir, and 12
4th-6th graders in Wesleyan Choir.

Worship & Music

In Koinonia, worshippers have sung **156 songs** and hymns, an average of 5 per service! In Traditional, worshippers have sung more than **107 songs and hymns**.

We have read the scriptures and prayed together more

110 corporate worship experiences offered

than 208 times in worship.

We added **5 new** worship team singers to the Koinonia worship team and are looking for



volunteers to help with the Koinonia tech team.

Our celebration of Communion has evolved from pandemic-driven drive-thru only options to pre-packaged communion elements and now to various modes, including taking communion at the rail with the help of lay servers. A group of Communion Stewards was formed to prepare Communion.

In September a Lay Reader Breakfast was held, and we now have **22 readers** scheduled in our Traditional service with youth and others reading at other times. Worship attendance has increased 41% overall: 49% in Koinonia and 38% in Traditional

Our **live-stream ministry** is found on Facebook with links on our webpage. Online streaming is a vital connection for those unable to worship in person and has reached people as far away as South Africa and the Philippines.

Resilience

A Sunday school gathering that developed from a short-term class organized by the resilience team in 2019 has continued to meet; the class is now called Resilient Faith. The class was meeting by Zoom and has transitioned back to meeting in person. Studies in the last year have included *Resilient Faith*, by Mary Jo Sharp, based on 1 Peter, and *Even If: A Study of Habakkuk*, by Kristin Schmucker with the Daily Grace Co.

Christian Action Group

Continuing the work it began in early 2020, the Christian Action Group held and supported work to call attention to racial justice, the climate crisis, and United Methodist Church policies on same-sex marriage and ordination.

United Methodist Policies on Human Sexuality In 2022, Christian Action worked closely with St. Paul's Strategic Renovation Team to conduct a survey of the attitudes of St. Paul members related to the sexuality issues being debated by the worldwide United Methodist Church.

Organizing for Clean Energy

Christian Action's environmental focus took the form of being one of the key sponsors of a series of quarterly Zoom events, titled "REAL Good News," to help encourage implementation of a Louisville Metro Council resolution for the city to get 100% of its energy from renewable resources

by 2040. In the spring of 2022, REAL Good News held a virtual mayors forum focused on the

clean energy resolution, just ahead of the mayoral primary. Seven of the candidates answered questions about the resolution and the event was attended by more than 100 people. In September REAL Good News held its eighth event; this one focused on progress toward renewable energy by Louisville and Cincinnati, which passed a similar green energy resolution.

Support for Racial Justice

In 2021, Christian Action supported St. Paul's Spiritual Formation Team in a series of conversations with Coke Memorial United Methodist Church about racial justice.

Trustees

Thanks to ongoing generosity and bequests, the Trustees have been able to complete several projects this year. These include:



A professional roofing consultant was hired to examine the Family Life Center roof situation, to analyze bids of roof replacement, and to

create a scope of work for companies to follow in replacing the FLC roof. This is a major job, and the Trustees are making plans for replacing this roof when sufficient funds are available.

The church partnered with the Highland Community Ministries daycare to purchase and install a new **commercial grade dishwasher** for the kitchen. The new unit is functioning well and will ensure the smooth running of church functions involving food for years to come.



Several dead and ailing trees have been removed or trimmed on the church campus. This **keeps our grounds looking great** and



also keeps them safe for everyone to enjoy.

The Trustees began receiving **bids to rebuild the retaining wall** to the right of the handicap entrance on the church grounds. The hope is to have an attractive and functional wall in place soon.

The Trustees continued this year in reviewing the church's various building-related contracts and working to make sure the church is getting the best deal possible in all the various services it requires.

Various other repairs, including HVAC maintenance, plumbing jobs, and electrical work, are also made possible by the generosity of our congregation.




Stop Human Trafficking Conference

Each year we make a disbursement from the Endowment. We take the average of the previous 3 years and distribute 5%. Here are the 2022 totals:

- Trustees: \$49,219 (72.2%)

- Music Enhancement: \$9,544 (14%)

- Missions: \$5,454 (8%)

- Scholarship Fund: \$1,704 (2.5%) - Flower Fund: \$2,250 (3.3%)
