#### At the Threshold of Yesterday and Tomorrow

The beginning of a new year is a threshold - an opportunity to look back and to look ahead. I want to invite you to listen to your life and discover what it might say to you.



"One day you'll look back and reclise how hard it was, and Just how well you did."

As you reflect on your life, know that I am offering a prayer, which includes two hopes. The first comes from a favorite children's book of mine, The Boy, the Mole, the Fox, and the Horse. Standing together and about to cross

the river, the horse says to the boy, "One day you'll look back and realize how hard it was, and just how well you did." The illusion in life is that we can somehow make it perfect with our hard work and determination. Surely, there are those occasions that are just perfect - like watching the sunset explode with color from your favorite spot on the porch. Life is also full of moments that don't get better right away and dreams that are still incomplete. I hope we can recognize grace is in all of our moments and have compassion for ourselves.

The second is that you have a deep knowing of what the first disciples experienced. After the

resurrection, the angel says to the women, "Go quickly and tell his disciples...he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him." (Matthew 28:7). In the new year, Jesus is going ahead of us to prepare the way - a way filled with grace if only we can recognize it. Much grace to you in the new year and as you listen to your life.

# Worship in January 2024 Features Stars and Water

Stars and water feature prominently in the stories we'll read in the New Year. On Epiphany Sunday (January 7), we hear the story of Magi from the East following a star (Matthew 2:1-12). One way we enter the story is with the Star Word tradition. When you come forward for communion, you'll be offered a word in the shape of a star.

Consider how God gave the Wise Men a star for guidance. How might God use a word to guide you or help you go deeper in your walk with God? Ponder the Star Word. Please keep it where you will



see it often: refrigerator, on your nightstand, wallet, etc. Pray and ask God to show you how this word speaks to your life. You can keep the word private, just between you and God. Or you could share your word with others and see what insights they offer.

Your Star Word could be something:

- You need more (or less!) of in your life.
- A quality in your life or a relationship that needs your attention.

- That will bring you closer to God and bless you and others.
- You need to wrestle with in order to gain understanding.

Water is the central image for our observance of the Baptism of the Lord on Sunday, January 21. In Mark 1:4-11, we read how John baptized Jesus in the River Jordan, and Jesus heard from deep within the Voice that said, "You are my beloved in whom I am well pleased." During worship on that Sunday, we will remember our Baptism and think of those who nurtured us so that we could experience the sacrament of belonging.

The following Saturday (January 27), we'll gather from 10am-Noon for our Leadership Orientation for anyone serving on church ministry and administrative teams.

Worship keeps us focused on God and renews us. I hope you'll plan to worship with us in the New Year.

#### January 2024 Hymn of the Month: Christ Our Hope in Life and Death

One of the oldest teaching methods, used by the Greek philosopher Socrates himself, is the asking of questions. It was also the method used by the teachers of the Reformation to pass on the faith to those who were preparing themselves for baptism and entrance into the Church. Our hymn of the month uses that same method to pass on deep theological truths to us today. Each stanza asks us a question and then provides the answer.

Stanza 1 was based on the opening question of the Heidelberg Catechism\* - one of the first catechisms of the Reformation. It's first question is this:

1. Q. What is your only comfort in life and death?
A. That I am not my own,[1] but belong with body and soul, both in life and in death,[2] to my faithful Saviour Jesus Christ.[3] He has fully paid for all my sins with His precious blood, and has set me free from all the power of the devil.[5] He also preserves me in such a way[6] that without the will of my heavenly Father not a hair can fall from my head;[7] indeed, all things must work together for my salvation.[8] Therefore, by His Holy Spirit He also assures me of eternal life[9] and makes me heartily willing and ready from now on to live for Him.[10]

[1] I Cor. 6:19, 20 [2] Rom. 14:7-9. [3] I Cor. 3:23; Tit. 2:14. [4] I Pet. 1:18, 19; I John 1:7; 2:2. [5] John 8:34-36; Heb. 2:14, 15; I John 3:8. [6] John 6:39, 40; 10:27-30; II Thess. 3:3; I Pet. 1:5. [7] Matt. 10:29-31; Luke 21:16-18. [8] Rom. 8:28. [9] Rom. 8:15, 16; II Cor. 1:21, 22; 5:5; Eph. 1:13, 14. [10] Rom. 8:14.

The first stanza of our hymn mirrors this: What is our hope in life and death? Christ alone Christ alone. What is our only confidence? That our souls to Him belong.
Who holds our days within His hand?
What comes apart from His command?
And what will keep us to the end?
The love of Christ in which we stand.

Each stanza grapples with some of the deep questions of our human existence. Stanza 2 asks where we can go when our fear outstrips our faith and the storms of life seem about to break us to pieces. Stanza 3 helps us face the reality of death as well as the hope of eternal life. And where is all this hope centered? Where is the source? It is, was, and always shall be in Jesus Christ.

Our response to such an amazing revelation is praise and thanksgiving, which the chorus helps us voice:

O sing hallelujah! Our hope springs eternal;

O sing hallelujah!

Now and ever we confess

Christ our hope in life and death.

As We sing this hymn in our services this month and around our homes, spend time thinking about the text and what it means for your heart and life, for your family. May we all be encouraged in our only hope: Jesus Christ.

- 4. Why? The Question on Replay Finding freedom in not having all the answers.
- 5. A Better Broken How to change despite our unchanging circumstances.

After that, we'll begin Max Lucado's **You Are Never Alone** DVD bible study, a walk through John's Gospel and that explores Christ's miracles and how He's still at work in our lives today! In this six session video study, you'll discover you're stronger than you think because with Jesus in our lives, we are never truly alone.








# **Highlands Community Blood Drive**

### **Update on the White Building** by Jason Ramsey

The White Building Committee, formed and led by Betty Jo Fore, as a sub-committee under the Trustees, presented to St. Paul UMC's governing board during the first week of December, with recommended plans for the future of the White Building. This building is owned by the church, sitting adjacent to our parking lot on Douglass Blvd. The building has been used solely for storage during the past few years, as the building is not up to code and is in need of repairs/renovations. I am happy to



convey that the presented plan was well received and accepted by the Board in concept, pending funding.

The building must be renovated prior to any use (brought up to code, in addition to other needed repairs). Funding is not currently available for the project, but charting out a definitive plan for the space moves us one step closer to utilization as we search for funding. Once the renovation work can

be funded, the committee recommends that the building should serve as the St. Paul UMC Outreach Center, providing space for the Resource Center and Boy Scouts, while also providing meeting space for Bible studies, Sunday school classes, AA Groups, etc.

While specific renovation details will be decided at a future time (by a committee made up of stakeholders and intended users), the renovations will need to include: 1) Making the first floor handicap accessible, 2) Ensuring there are two bathrooms on first floor, with at least one being handicap accessible, 3) A working kitchen/ kitchenette, 4) Room for Resource Center supplies, 5) Room for Resource Center staff/volunteers to assemble and operate, 6) A front room to be used for meetings, 7) Meeting area for Scouts, and 8) Storage area for the Scouts in the basement.

The church is appreciative of the efforts of Betty Jo Fore and other White Building Committee members: Sal Rubino, Bill Fenton, Whitney Meadows, Amy Johnson, Dustin Woods, and Jason Ramsey.
