
THE LION AND THE LAMB

Easter comes early this year. On March 31st, we will gather to end the Lenten season and celebrate Christ's resurrection! This means that the month of March contains the bulk of the Lenten season and ends on its very last day with the good news of new life. Growing up, I often heard that March might come in like a lion and go out like a lamb or vice versa. It is a saying that has to do with the belief that a beginning of one sort of weather will result in an ending of its opposite. It also occurs to me now that the Lion and the Lamb are both symbols that the Scriptures use to depict Christ.

Indeed, it might take a Lion to face down the brokenness and challenges of our world and our lives. Scriptures we read during Lent depict Jesus facing down Satan in the wilderness, cleansing the Temple of wickedness, and confronting His own destiny to die on a Cross. Jesus as the Lion of Judah grapples with temptation, sin, suffering, and even death, and He perseveres. For much of this month, you and I will be looking at our world and within ourselves. We will confront darkness as we experience it. We will ask questions: What needs to change? What needs to be let go of? What do I need freedom from? We will call on the Lion of Judah to help us address the answers as they come and to help us persevere through our own brokenness. And the Lion will answer.

If the old saying is true and the liturgical calendar is correct, we will end the month with the



Once Jesus as the Lion has helped you confront failures and evils, Christ as the Lamb invites you into something beautiful beyond all of them. As we enter into Easter we can ask ourselves: What does God hold in store for me? What seeds of new life is God planting in my life, in my church's, in my community's? God has a place for each of us, individually and in community, in God's redemption. At March's end, let us celebrate the Lamb's new dawn and the light it holds for all of us.

Good Friday Tenebrae Service - March 29


7:30pm in the Sanctuary

Faith Quilters

Displacement and loneliness are said to be features of many folks' lives these days. Participation in a group that offers belonging and active purpose may be an answer.

Faith Quilters has flourished at St Paul for 21 years, attempting to help traumatized children by sewing homemade comfort blankets for them. The quilters at the same time may meet their own needs to be creative, part of a team, a lifelong learner, and a contributor to the nationally acclaimed Project Linus organization.

On Sunday, March 10, at both services, the quilts produced since last March will be blessed. They will then be ready for loving distribution to local children in hospital, those served by the child advocacy center, build-a-bed recipients, houseless children, and Center for Women and Families resident children, among others.

St Paul community action steps:

- Relish the color, design, uniqueness of the quilts being blessed on March 10.
- Chat with the quilters as they fold and collect blankets after each service.
- Keep the child recipients and the sewists in prayer.
- Consider visiting Faith Quilters on their 3rd Tuesday workdays.
- Ask how involvement begins.

Since 2003 Faith Quilters have made 1732 blankets with 70 of them sewn over the past year. The group is humbled by the powerful examples set by the St Paul founders and is joyful in "keepin' on!"

February 2024 Hymn of the Month: Beneath the Cross of Jesus

The month of March will contain the bulk of Lent and the celebration of Easter. It seems appropriate that we pick a hymn that focuses on the cross and what it accomplished for us. *Beneath the Cross of Jesus* was published in 1872 after the death of author Elizabeth Clephane in 1869. Our hymnal contains three stanzas of this hymn. The first stanza draws our attention to the cross as a place of refuge from the trials of this life. In the second stanza, the author turns our eyes directly to the form of Christ on the cross. Seeing the crucified Christ, we are led to consider the amazing, redeeming love of God despite our unworthiness. Having seen this truth, the third stanza leads us to claim the cross as our "abiding place." There are two scriptural allusions:

Philippians 2:7-8: But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ.

Galatians 6:14: As for me, may I never boast about anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. Because of that cross, my interest in this world has been crucified, and the world's interest in me has also died.

The author encourages us to find our identity not in the world, but in the cross-to count all that the world values as loss and all that the cross offers as gain.

- Beneath the cross of Jesus I fain would take my stand, the shadow of a mighty rock within a weary land; a home within the wilderness, a rest upon the way,from the burning of the noontide heat, and the burden of the day.
- 2. Upon that cross of Jesus mine eye at times can see the very dying form of One who suffered there for me; and from my stricken heart with tears, two wonders I confess:the wonders of redeeming love and my unworthiness.
- 3. I take, O cross, thy shadow for my abiding place; I ask no other sunshine than the sunshine of his face; content to let the world go by, to know no gain nor loss, my sinful self my only shame, my glory all the cross.

There are two other stanzas to this hymn that are not generally found in most hymnals. Originally these were the second and third stanzas of the hymn. The first of these shows the cross as the place where God's love and justice meet (What an amazing image!), and then likens the cross to Jacob's ladder from the Bible—but instead of angels climbing up and down, now sinners are able to ascend to heaven.

O safe and happy shelter! O refuge tried and sweet! O trysting place where heaven's love and heaven's justice meet! As to the holy patriarch that wondrous dream was given, so seems my Saviour's cross to me a ladder up to heav'n.

The next stanza lays out the salvation that is available to us through the cross. Now the Cross stands between us and the grave – not of physical death but the eternal death of hell. The cross stands as a watchman to prevent us from entering "that eternal grave."

There lies, beneath its shadow but on the farther side, the darkness of an awful grave that gapes both deep and wide; and there between us stands the cross, two arms outstretched to save; a watchman set to guard the way from that eternal grave.

As we continue our Lenten journey to the celebration of Easter, may this hymn help us reflect on the grace that is ours in Christ Jesus and the cost of that grace.



Key messages from speakers at the 4th Annual Stop Human Trafficking Conference at St. Paul

Get survivors involved. Give them a voice to tell their stories and provide solutions. If you don't you're not serving the victims. Survivors can establish rapport with kids suffering the same kinds of heinous abuse they themselves have suffered. They can show them their own mental and physical scars. Regardless of your background, however, you can help. Don't think the issue is too big to do anything about. Find something you're good at and volunteer, simple things such as making meals or blankets for kids, donating bed sheets and old books; connect with the experts at survivor-led organizations.

Dr. Azurdee Garland, co-founder and executive director of programming for Phoenix Rising, Inc., a nonprofit foundation serving youth impacted by commercial exploitation and domestic sex trafficking. Dr. Garland was bought and sold by family members starting at age 4, and her son was born when she was 11.

Fight the minimization of our language so that words like "rape," "torture," " exploitation," "incest," and "prostitution," especially of kids, are not watered down and made to sound less horrendous than they are. Silence is our enemy. Keep talking about the violence and dehumanization of sex trafficking. Criminal, not civil, prosecution is the only thing that stops perpetrators. A lot of exploitation is now online and most child porn is made at home. The real horror of child porn is that you can't get rid of it. Once loaded to the internet it outlasts the life of the victim. Society is getting more and more dysfunctional and the only way to stop the consumers of human trafficking is to arrest, adjudicate and incarcerate; which is hard to do because a lot of the perpetrators and their protectors are in important and influential positions. We have the tools, we just don't enforce the law. Ramp up your advocacy for holding perpetrators accountable. We have to arrest the baby rapers.

Survivor leader Jeanette Westbrook is a social worker and human rights defender. Ms. Westbrook has used her experience as a survivor of non-state torture and trafficking to advocate for international treaties and policies that empower exploited women and girls. As an 8-year-old, Ms. Westbrook was



exploited in pornographic films by family members. In 1992 she was able to prosecute one of her perpetrators for rape and incest since Kentucky has no statute of limitations on felony crimes.

When it comes to helping victims become survivors, we need to change the very language we use. Stop asking "What is wrong with you?" and start asking "What happened to you?" This is a war, it's a spiritual war. We need to help people understand they have a stake in the fight and tell them the many ways they can help: through legislation, becoming a mentor, supporting existing agencies, educating the public on building community advocates, helping survivors get healthy, increase the penalties for traffickers and users, rework the foster system to ensure high standards of care, provide tools to counselors to be able to act quickly when children are in danger. If you have a little time, or a skill or a trade or can help financially it can all make a difference. Find out where your place is in the fight. We need more men in this fight.

Cindy Crawford started Sycamore Farm, a nonprofit ministry in Louisville to provide sexually exploited women an opportunity to heal through holistic, trauma-informed residential care and lifelong discipleship. In 2023 Sycamore Farm opened the first and only emergency home dedicated to women wanting to escape their trafficking situation. Sycamore Farm is for women who need to get off the street right away, and it provides an immediate safe and stable environment to prepare them for the next step. Ms. Crawford is a survivor of sexual exploitation.

Agape Valentine's Oay Party Message

Julia Mitchell shared the following reflection that evening:

Good evening. Thank you for the gift of your presence here tonight. I want to extend special gratitude to our friends from Coke Memorial who have joined us; you are always welcome here. Thank you also to the wonderful Resilience team members who have worked so hard to bring this event together---shout out to Joanne Milo, Peggy Lutes, Debbie Chambers, and Beth Nichols! Thank you to the staff as well who have been so supportive. Thank you all for being a part of communal resilience by choosing to celebrate in the midst of challenges.

We may envision resilience as dogged determination to strive strenuously and overcome a struggle or setback.

We may applaud one's resilience for enduring suffering or trauma.

We may encourage children and youth to be resilient in the face of an obstacle or defeat.

We may think of resilience as an individual trait or skills that one person has achieved.

But what if the wilderness lingers...past Lent...past the pandemic...past the timeline we would prefer?

What if discouragement and disillusionment become too familiar and the buzzwords and trite expressions no longer match the weight of the world's brokenness?

What then...propels the grit...beckons the perseverance...ensures the tenacity?
