CURIOSITY

Tracy Martin, Director of Family and Children's Ministries

You may already know this—but here's something I have learned over the years: maintaining a curious, open mind is absolutely necessary when working with children. In the past, I have accidentally killed many conversations by having specific expectations, deciding a kid's answer was wrong, or being unwilling to think creatively. Little kids thrive when they are encouraged to think for themselves, and this creative freedom will rarely lead them to the answers we adults would expect. Their curiosity is a sweet gift and a reminder that we should be open to the unexpected.

But maintaining openness and curiosity isn't just important for people who spend time with children—it is essential for us as humans, and specifically as Christians! "How much better to get wisdom than gold, to get insight rather than silver!" (Proverbs 16:16). "Open my eyes, so that I may contemplate wondrous things from your instruction!" (Psalm 119:18). "The heart of the discerning acquires knowledge, for the ears of the wise seek it out" (Proverbs 18:15). In fact, curiosity seems like a requirement for all believers simply because God is intangible; we are called to believe wholeheartedly in someone we can't even see! A certain degree of openness is required.

But how can we remain curious, open, and more childlike in our willingness to accept new ideas? How often do you seek out new information? Do you consider yourself a "lifelong learner"? Where do you go to learn new things? Who do you ask when you want answers? Over the past year, I've been blessed with many opportunities to learn new things. I want to share some of them with you, with the humble hope that you might continue to thirst for knowledge and share it with others.

First of all, I knew nothing about Methodism as a denomination, but I find its history and organizational structure fascinating. I had never heard of prevenient grace, social holiness, or practical divinity. I was unfamiliar with John Wesley. Did you know he wrote a medical textbook that encouraged people to live healthy lifestyles, even though he wasn't a doctor? Did you know the term "Methodist" was originally an insult? Did you know there are over 12 million Methodists around the world? Do you notice when our tablecloths, robes, and choir stoles ("paraments and vestments") switch colors according to the liturgical calendar? Did you know that women have served as bishops in the United Methodist Church since 1980? One thing that I appreciate is this denomination's recognition that surface-level differences in belief do not prevent us from worshipping, fellowshipping, or serving together as a church body.

I've also learned about St. Paul's history and architecture! Did you know the

wooden doors of our church are painted red because just as we must pass through the doors to enter the Lord's house, the only way to salvation is through the sacrificial blood of Christ? Did you know the acorns carved into our sanctuary pews represent the small beginnings of Christianity, just as an oak tree begins its life as a tiny acorn? And the candelabras lit by the acolytes each week hold seven candles, which represent the seven gifts mentioned in Revelation 5:12: "Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honor and glory and praise." Also, there are twelve shields of the Apostles at the ends of the ceiling beams-each one featuring images which represent a different Apostle. I love how much care and intentionality went into the design of our church building, and I love how each symbol points us to the reason we are here: Jesus Christ!

Recently I've also been able to nurture an interest in music, and I'm lucky to have landed at a church where music is highly valued (and where patient, accomplished musicians are available to answer my questions!). I have learned about scales, key signatures, intervals, and how to read music! I took an online course and an in-person course, both of which challenged me in new ways. Did you know that an 11th-century monk named Guido invented the modern way we learn notes ("do-re-mi"), and that he used different parts of his hand to tell his choir which notes to sing? Did you know the black keys on a piano make up a pentatonic scale? Did you know that human brains naturally try to "fill in the blanks" when they hear a scale? Did you know that your voice can sound completely different depending on how you position your jaw and lips? One of my favorite realizations during one of my classes was this: our voices are merely instruments, and-like any other instrument-we can learn how to "play" them better! I love being able to make a joyful noise unto the Lord!

Earlier I posed some rhetorical questions about how much time you spend learning new things. My prayer is that regardless of what season we're passing through, we remember to seek knowledge and grow in wisdom. Did you know God never tires of our questions? Our Father LOVES when we come to him with curiosity and a desire to know Him better. How much of your time is spent studying the Lord's attributes, actions, and commands? How much time do you spend learning about the wonderful things He has created? For me, the answer is "not enough!" But I hope we can all challenge ourselves and spur each other on in this direction.

May 2024 Hymn of the Month: You Alone Are Holy

I have said it before and I will say it again: we are a singing faith. Sometimes we sing hymns that have been handed down from third-century Christians. Sometimes we sing hymns that were written less than a year ago. Most of the hymns we use were written by lyricists and composers who share our culture, or at least our historical culture. But it would be a mistake to think that all Christians share our ethnic culture. One way we can connect with our brothers and sisters from other cultures is to sing their songs. These songs help us understand their experiences with God as well as how God's story has connected and impacted their culture.

One such song is "You Alone Are Holy" from *The Faith We Sing* #2077. This chorus comes from our Spanish speaking brothers and sisters and is based on Revelation 4:11. It was translated by Raquel Mora Martinez. Mrs. Martinez has been a huge force in Spanish hymnody serving as the editor for the official United Methodist Spanish-language hymnal, Mil Voces Para Celebrar (Nashville, 1996). She has also composed or arranged over 33 hymn tunes which can be found in various Spanish language hymnals. She and her husband, Bishop Joel Martinez, have served United Methodists throughout Texas and Nebraska.

Sometimes the hymns we sing are long and full of deep theological teaching. Sometimes the songs we sing are short and help us voice the deep feelings and adoration in our hearts. "You Alone Are Holy" is one of those shorter songs. As we sing, we are giving voice to the cry of the 24 elders that worship around the throne of God in the Book of Revelation. "You are worthy, our Lord and God,

to receive glory and honor and power, for you created all things,

and by your will they existed and were created." (Rev. 4:11, NRSV)

So we join our voices with the heavenly worship of God:

Verse 1
You alone are holy
You alone are worthy
You are filled with splendor
And with awesome wonder
For our sins You suffered
Died and resurrected
Granting us salvation
Giving us eternal life

Verse 2
You alone are holy
You alone are worthy
You are filled with splendor
And with awesome wonder
Send Your Holy Spirit
May it shine upon us
Let Your wondrous glory
With its radiance fill this place

Staff Spotlight: Brooke Heitz, Financial Administrator

I was born and raised here in Louisville. I grew up going to Holy Spirit Catholic Church, where I received all of my sacraments as well as attended the corresponding parochial school. I graduated from Assumption High School and went on to the University of Kentucky, where I earned my Bachelor of Science degree in Accounting. A few years later, while in the "working world" and being involved in a few different organizations - professional, political, and Catholic - I met my husband, Paul-Victor, and we married in 2012. I became a full-time stay-athome mom in February 2014 with the birth of our daughter, Ava, and had our identical twin boys, Victor & Oliver, in March 2017, just after being elected Commissioner in the home-rule city in which I live, Strathmoor Manor.



I always knew I wanted to work again - part-time - when my youngest child (Or in this case, children!) was in school full-day, so when I started looking and applying for jobs in summer 2022, a fellow Strathmoor Manor Commissioner who is affiliated with St. Paul and knows my financial background told me about the Financial Administrator position

opening. It sounded like it would be a good fit, so I applied and interviewed and couldn't be happier that I did! There was a mutual connection. I began working here in August 2022, on my kids' first day of school.

Working at St. Paul is great! On Mondays I process contributions; on Tuesdays I run payroll and accounts payable; and Wednesdays and Thursdays I perform other duties, such as reconcile bank statements, post church credit card entries to the General Ledger, file tax returns and pay employee taxes withheld, contribute to the United Methodist

Personal Investment Plan on behalf of St. Paul staff, generate letters to memorials contributors and bereaved families, and solve any puzzles that might come up! I also manage employee files and distribute monthly financial reports to staff, keep track of employee time off, generate and edit the quarterly and year-end contribution statements, prepare financial statements for the Finance Team & Administrative Board meetings, and type up and send the minutes for those meetings after they have occurred.

I have learned so much working at St. Paul, and everyone I work with and meet here is wonderful! Outside of my time at St. Paul, I attend Mass with my family at the Shrine of St. Martin of Tours, of which we are members; serve on the Strathmoor Manor Commission; fundraise for my church and children's school whenever those opportunities arise; and drive my kids to and from their activities, which include dance for Ava (Come see her in The Brown-Forman Nutcracker this winter!) and soccer for Victor & Oliver, as well as their play dates, birthday parties, and whatnot. I enjoy managing my family's calendar and our To Do list and making sauces out of the tomatoes that my hubby so lovingly grows in our backyard garden. I have a keen interest in health

and wellness, personal finance, and education and, being process-oriented, am drawn to the systematic approach and problem-solving opportunities that those areas afford.
