

#### VISION TEAM REPORT: FIND YOUR COMMUNITY AT ST. PAUL

Hello, everyone! It's the beginning of a new school year, and this is the time of year for families to get back into the familiar routines of school and kids' activities. This is also the time when Sunday schools, choirs, and Wesley nights start back up! I eagerly look forward to this time of year. I love catching up with friends, hearing about family vacations, starting new topics in Sunday school, and gathering on Wednesday evenings for Wesley night dinners and activities. Yes, I love my St. Paul community!

Last fall, the Vision Team conducted a church-wide survey to find out what was on everyone's hearts about the different ministries at St Paul. The topic that was most frequently mentioned was the Family, Children and Youth ministries. Since then, the Children and Youth teams have been working on all the feedback that was received.

Here are some of the things being worked on:

- encourage participation in the Sunday school program
- continue to offer worship opportunities for kids such as: kid's worship nights with different themes, singing in worship, and doing readings in worship
- offer a weekday morning gathering for stay-athome parents and their children (babies up to age
   4) that will include parent hang time as well as a funmusic time with their kids
- offer connection for 25 to 40 year olds and consider opportunities for this age group to meet outside of Sunday mornings
- offer a family retreat at Camp Loucon
- Family/Children/Youth Ministry is the foundation of our church

The Children and Youth Teams provide so many ways for our kiddos to be really involved in our church choir, tweens, youth group, and so much more. Clearly, we want our children to have the opportunity to be in a vibrant community where they feel safe, valued, and where they can experience God's love.

We know that these things are important for our kids, but do we seek that out for ourselves? What would your ideal community here at St. Paul look like? What would make you excited to show up every Sunday morning, or Wednesday evening? Connecting with friends? Learning about God? Getting together for a game of pick-up basketball in the gym? Serving together? Just having a conversation in the Common Cup? Or maybe having a group to work on social

justice issues would be your thing. I encourage you to take a few minutes to think about what you want your community at St. Paul to look like. Then, let's work together to make that happen!

There are so many wonderful opportunities to be involved at St. Paul this fall and to create the community you want to be a part of here. # September Hymn of the Month: There is One Gospel

What makes a song a good one for congregational singing? Not just any faith-based song will do. There are two main criteria we look for when we are choosing songs for worship. First, the song must be strong theologically. It must put forth true things about God, God's world, our relationship to God, and/or God's work in our world. Second, it must be musically accessible to the people singing it. Briefly put, it must be singable. If the range is too wide or the melody too hard to follow, the people just won't sing. These two criteria are especially important when introducing new songs into our congregation's rotation of hymns and songs.

"There is One Gospel" by CitiAlight, the worship ministry of St. Paul's Castle Hill in Sydney, Australia, meets both of those criteria. This song joyfully proclaims the Gospel as we sing it. We are reminded that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is the only thing we can stand on, and that Gospel is that Jesus Christ came to earth, died on the cross for our sins, rose from the dead, through his resurrection gave us hope, and created the Church to represent him on earth, and will one day bring us home to heaven.

The melody is also very singable. It has mostly motion by step, with only a few skips to add flavor. The 6/8 meter makes the song joyful and bouncy. It makes you want to throw your arms over the shoulders of your friends as you sing along. At the risk of being crude, it has the singability of a good drinking song.

Some of you will already know this great hymn, for others it will be brand new. As we sing this song this month, may the truth of the Gospel and the joy it brings go deep into our souls as we sing to one another.

#### Verse 1

There is one Gospel on which I stand For all eternity. It is my story, my Father's plan, The Son has rescued me.

Oh, what a Gospel, Oh, what a peace. My highest joy and my deepest need/ Now and forever, He is my light. I stand in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

#### Verse 2

There is one Gospel to which I cling, All else I count as loss. For there, where justice and mercy meet, He saved me on the cross. No more I boast in what I can bring, No more I carry the weight of sin. For He has brought me from death to life. I stand in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

#### Verse 3

There is one Gospel where hope is found, The empty tomb still speaks. For death could not keep my Saviour down, He lives and I am free. Now on my Saviour, I fix my eyes, My life is His and His hope is mine! For He has promised I, too, will rise I stand in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

#### Verse 4

And in this Gospel, the Church is one, We do not walk alone.
We have His Spirit as we press on To lead us safely home.
And when in glory still I will sing Of this old story that rescued me.
Praise to my Saviour, the King of life. I stand in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

## **Safety Team Tips**

It is getting to be that time of year when activities are increasing daily at church.

Here are some tips to keep you, and your fellow churchgoers, safe.

Do not let anyone in the building you do not know.

Lock your vehicle and don't leave valuables in sight. If you have to leave them in your vehicle, lock them in the trunk.

Always walk to your car in a group.

Always be aware of your surroundings.

If you encounter someone who makes you feel uncomfortable, do not engage. Walk away from them and let a staff member or safety team member know about the individual.

The Highlands has seen an increase in our unsheltered community. Our Resource Center offers support to this community on Mondays and

Wednesday from 10am-1pm, providing clothing, hygiene, and food to meet their everyday needs. Most of these visitors are respectful and grateful, and they appreciate a friendly "Hello." If you encounter one of these visitors who asks you for money, please do not comply. Let them know the church can offer assistance with basic necessities. The information about our Resource Center hours is on the glass door at the elevator entrance. On occasion, we encounter someone who is having a medical or mental emergency, which could make them agitated or violent. If you see someone in this condition, please walk away and reach out to a staff member.

#### My St. Paul Story: How I got Here; Why I stayed.

About the time Joanne was looking for a church with contemporary music, we were both looking for a handsome sanctuary for our wedding. I knew little about modern Christian music other than I liked it. The clincher for joining St. Paul was Pastor Gibson's comment we could save five hundred dollars on the ceremony by becoming members.

That was a little more than ten years ago. But the reason I stayed wasn't just the music. Until St. Paul, I'd been pretty rootless: first as a child of missionaries, then as a Coast Guardsman, and finally, an Army civilian - mostly sub-Saharan Africa and Western Europe. I wasn't connected in any meaningful way to any congregation or denomination. My spiritual life drifted and sputtered.

At St. Paul, my extracurricular involvement is welcomed and encouraged. Opportunities to grow, serve and live abundantly abound. I'm building relationships. And if I listen - still a challenge - I'm enriched by different perspectives

and those with deeper faith. St. Paul is well stocked with what I call "urban missionaries": saints active in our own body of believers while contributing to communities outside our walls. They are the dynamic duos like Graeme and Jane, BJ and Ray, Paul and Debbie, Jimmy and D'Anna, Gail and Ed; and the super singles like Glenda, Genie, Donna and Carl. Too many to name here.

Another significant reason for staying is the spirit of inclusiveness that emanates from the sacrament of communion. I never, ever, get tired of hearing the invitation



to everyone that the table is the Lord's and all are welcome to the celebration.
